### An Example of a Standard Fiction Text

#### The Girl Who Walked On Air

The girl who *Walked On Air* is written by Emma Carroll, an author and English teacher. It is about a girl called Louie who works in the ticket office of a circus, but dreams about performing in the circus herself. In this extract, she can't wait to see an evening performance.

- The bigger the danger, the bigger the crowd. One look at tonight's posters said it all. With just minutes till show time, the big top was almost full and I was quite ready to burn with excitement. Every last ticket was sold. And still the gorse snaked out of the field and down the lane until all you could see were people's hats bobbing above the hedgerows.
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- First thing this morning, the posters had gone up all over town. "MORE DARING THAN EVER!" they'd said in blue and gold letters. "WATCH MONSIEUR MERCURY DEIFY GRAVITY ON HIS TRAPEZE!" To me, Mr Mercury was great! It's Jaeger, who I lived with in a tiny trailer, and who drank lapping tea\* out of lapping cups and let me have first dibs on every peanut. Which was more than could be said for my mum. When I was just a baby she left me in the cinder, the way most people forget an ashtray.
- Inside the ticket booth where I worked, there wasn't space to swing a cat. I felt it specially tonight, jiggling from foot to foot, desperate to get finished so I'd be free to watch the show. My dog Flip sensed it too, sat beside me, he watched my every move. At last, the final poster. The best in class. Best tickets. They were a noisy bunch, laughing and raising their teeth like smoke in the evening air. They'd be quiet soon enough. Once they were inside the big top, they'd squeeze onto a bench and look upwards. And what they'd see would leave them speechless.
- A little shiver went down my neck. *Imagine if I was about to perform. All those eyes going up at me. How amazing it!*
- I came back to work with a bang. The circus owner, Mr Leo Chapoline, was in the doorway. He'd put on his best tuxedo waistcoat and was smiling, which made a change. "Think of all these backstides or teats, Louie," he said as he squeezed in beside me to count the strings. "The bigger the danger..."
- "... the bigger the crowd," I finished for him.
- He did have a point. There were grander circuses than ours, with more animals, more acrobats, more spindles. Backstides on seats mattered. So, what better way to draw the crowds than a the flag over walking. And tonight that's exactly what they'd get. Jaeger would perform not a double but a TRIPLE somersault from his trapeze. No other circus boasted such a stunt. It was genius.

This is an example of the standard of fiction text that a Year 4 pupil should be able to read and understand. We would expect that a Year 4 pupil would be able to read this text fluently and with expression. We would also expect that they would be able to answer the following types of questions:

#### Questions about word meaning

Which word in lines 1-5 means the same as customers?

#### Questions that ask you to extract information from the passage

What is the name of the trapeze artist?

#### Questions that ask you to summarise the text

Describe what you know about Louie's job at the circus.

#### Questions that ask you to use the clues in the text to produce a reasoned answer

Why do you think the crowds are bigger when there is more danger?

#### Questions that ask you to use the text to make predictions

How do you think the evening performance will end?

#### Questions relating to the meaning of the whole text

Do you think the audience has looked forward to going to the circus?

Explain your answer.

#### Questions about the author's choice of language

What does 'breath like smoke' (Line 20) tell us about the evening?

#### Questions that ask you to compare different parts of the text

How does the author compare the mood of the crowd before the performance to the mood suggested during the performance?
